Description of activity:

The Emley Show is an agricultural event that runs annually, typically on the first Saturday of each August. It takes place at the aforementioned location, which is normally used for agricultural livestock and hayfield purposes. With the permission of the landowner and tenant, the land will be repurposed for the day for the purposes of the show.

This risk assessment covers general hazards associated with the activities of the Vintage Tractors, Cars & Motorbikes section and must be read in conjunction with the overall Emley Show risk assessment ES_H&S_RiskAssessment_001. Exhibitors can enter their vehicles into the show to participate in a range of activities and competitions which are hosted by the Vintage Tractors, Cars & Motorbikes Section. This includes the display and showing of their vehicles (where they will be stood on their allocated plot for most of the day), participation in the main showring activities where vehicles will be driven/rode round the main ring.

Where there are significant foreseeable hazards associated with individual vintage cars & tractors activities (inc. equipment), this must be consulted with the Vintage Tractors, Cars & Motorbikes Section Secretary well in advance of the day of the show (minimum 7 days prior). Where an assurance of safety is required by The Emley Show, it is likely that entrants will be asked to develop a suitable and sufficient risk assessment and safe system of work, detailing how these hazards will be managed. The hours of working will be from 8am until 7pm.

This risk assessment must be read in conjunction with The Emley Show rules, requirements, and expectations. All show expectations and requirements must be strictly adhered to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of all participants.

Moving vehicles during core show hours	Show participants being hit by moving vehicles during accessing the main show ring. This could result in a significant injury requiring hospital treatment.	This will include asking exhibitors to refrain and limit the use of horns, sirens and rewing engines. Failure to adhere to the code of conduct may result in expulsion, following consultation with senior show officials. 5mph site speed limit must not be exceeded at any point. Section Secretary or nominated show official to act as banks persons to walk the vehicles to the main ring. Additional volunteers required (minimum 6 persons) will be required to assist with the movement of vehicles during core hours. Any deviation from these requirements will mean controlled vehicle movements around the grounds will not take place. 		Any deviation from these requirements will mean controlled vehicle movements around the grounds will not take place. Failure to adhere to the code of conduct may result in expulsion, following consultation with senior show officials. Security and onsite police to provide support if this situation escalates.							
Unintentional contact with moving and hot parts of the vehicle	Entanglement of lose items of clothing and hair, or scolding hands / arms to show participants resulting in significant injury and requiring hospital treatment.	Vehicles will be fenced off so that show participants e.g., members of the public can look but not touch. Signs to be installed to restrict access beyond fenced off areas. Vehicle owners/exhibitors must always be in attendance when vehicles are operational, as they are competent in the correct procedures for controlling.	1	4	4	-	-	-	
Engine fire as a result of ignition of fuel	Possible burns and smoke inhalation causing significant injury to all participants, entrants and show officials.	Fire extinguishers will be present at the show, to tackle any small fire, only if individuals feel comfortable to do so. Awareness session of how to use extinguishers will be provided at an all- show safety briefing on the Friday before the show. Any large uncontrolled fire will result in radio call to senior show officials and the area / showground immediately evacuated by show officials and access restricted. For a significant fire, the emergency services will be contacted via 999 and ask for fire services.	1	4	4	-	-	-	
Vehicles stuck in mud	Show participants being hit by moving vehicles during attempts to move vehicles stuck in mud. This could result in a significant injury requiring hospital treatment.	All vehicles show come to the show with the appropriate towing eyes etc. so that vehicles can be moved. Members of the public etc. must not be engaged to help move vehicles that are stuck in mud. Show officials will request help from the showground manager so that stranded vehicles can be to be moved.
